Dear Parents,

Attached, you will find the **supply list** and **summer reading list** for incoming eighth grade students.

To encourage students to continue reading over the summer, we are providing reading lists of suggested titles to guide students in their reading choices. These lists were compiled by the classroom teachers and the library media specialist at Pelham Middle School. Our goal is for students to read during the summer as a fun and pleasurable activity.

The 2019 *Kids and Parent Reading Report* (7th Edition) by *Scholastic* states that "Seventy-four percent of kids say that reading fiction and nonfiction is a way to help them understand the world; 88% of parents say the same. More than half of kids (53%) and parents (55%) agree a book has helped them/their child through a difficult time." We believe that creating a "Summer Reading Life" filled with adventure and joy is critical to our students' overall development and should be a joint responsibility of the school and home. With this in mind, all middle school students should read a minimum of three books over the summer. These books may, but do not have to, come from the suggested reading list.

We encourage you to assist your child in fulfilling this summer reading requirement. Please keep in mind that some young adult books deal with sensitive or more mature themes or content. Therefore, previewing the books before your child begins to read is suggested. You may also want to read the books your child selects so that you can talk about them together. At the end of the summer, each student should complete the form on the last page of the reading list. This form asks for a list of the three books that your child chose to read along with a parent or guardian signature. These forms will be collected during the first week of school in September. Many of the titles are available as audiobooks or as e-books accessible through the Pelham Public Library or through the Sora app found on your child's Launchpad. Let's build a "Summer Reading Life" together filled with the magic of books!

Each student should then complete the form on the last page including the signature of a parent/guardian. These forms will be collected during the first week of school in September.

Suggested Summer Reading List – Incoming 7th and 8th Grades



Angry Young Man – Chris Lynch

Alexander (Xan) is an awkward loner who hasn't been able to find his place in the world. His half-brother, Robert, seems exactly the opposite. When Robert suspects Xan is traveling down a dangerous path of extremism, he is determined to intervene before it's too late. (Fiction)



Anything But Typical – Nora Raleigh Basken

Jason, an autistic teenager with a talent for creative writing, struggles to find acceptance in his middle school community. (Fiction)



April Morning – Howard Fast

The American Revolution leaps to life in this unforgettable account of the Battle of Lexington. It is also the story of a father and son who are at odds. (Historical Fiction)



Ball Don't Lie – Matt De La Pena

A teenager (Grayson Boucher) uses basketball to overcome his emotional scars and obsessive-compulsive personality disorder. (Sports/Realistic Fiction)



The Bar Code Tattoo - Suzanne Weyn

In the near future, Kayla finds herself running for her life when she refuses to get the mandatory bar code tattoo on her seventeenth birthday--a decision that renders her a social outcast and places her family in grave danger. (Science Fiction)



Black and White – Paul Volponi

Two-star high school basketball players, one black and one white, experience the justice system differently after committing a crime together and getting caught. (Realistic Fiction)



Chasing Lincoln's Killer - James Swanson

This is a biographical account of John Wilkes Booth's plot to kill the president and Booth's 12 days on the run following Lincoln's assassination. Also consider: The President Has Been Shot (Non-Fiction Biography)



Divergent - Veronica Roth

In Beatrice Prior's dystopian Chicago world, society is divided into five factions, each dedicated to the cultivation of a particular virtue—Candor (the honest), Abnegation (the selfless), Dauntless (the brave), Amity (the peaceful), and Erudite (the intelligent). On an appointed day of every year, all sixteen-year-olds must select the faction to which they will devote the rest of their lives. Perfect for fans of the Hunger Games and Maze Runner series. Sequels include *Insurgent* and *Allegiant* (Science Fiction/Adventure)




Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie -Jordan Sonnenblick

Thirteen-year-old Steven has a totally normal life until his younger brother Jeffrey is diagnosed with leukemia and Steven's world is turned upside down. A heartwarming journey through a year in the life of a family in crisis. (Realistic Fiction)



Elsewhere - Gabrielle Zevin

Elsewhere is where fifteen-year-old Liz Hall ends up, after she has died. It is a place so like Earth, yet completely different. (Magic Realism)



Ender's Game – Scott Orson Card

Government agencies breed child geniuses in order to combat the next alien attack. A brilliant boy, Andrew "Ender" Wiggins, makes the cut for military training but suffers from his own psychological battles. (Science Fiction)




Heat - Mike Lupica

Pitching prodigy Michael Arroyo is on the run from social services after being banned from playing Little League baseball because rival coaches doubt he is only 12 years old, and he has no parents to offer them proof. Also consider *The Home Team Series, The Only Game, The Extra Yard, Point Guard, and Team Players.* (Sports/fiction)



Hero - Mike Lupica

In this fast-paced adventure story, 14-year-old Zach Harriman races to uncover the mystery behind his dad's death, while also learning to control his new super-hero powers. (Fantasy)




Hoops - Walter Dean Myers

A teenage basketball player from Harlem is befriended by a former professional player who, after being forced to quit because of a point-shaving scandal, hopes to prevent other young athletes from repeating his mistake. (Sports/Fiction)



Hunger Games - Suzanne Collins

Long ago, the districts waged war on the Capitol and were defeated. As part of the surrender terms, each district agreed to send one boy and one girl to appear in an annual televised event called "The Hunger Games," a fight to the death. Sixteen-year-old Katniss Everdeen is forced to represent her district in the Games. Also consider: *Catching Fire* and *Mockingjay*



I am Malala - Malala Yousafzai, co-written by Patricia McCormick

Malala Yousafzai was only 10 years old when the Taliban took control of her region. They said music was a crime. They said women weren't allowed to go to the market. They said girls couldn't go to school. Malala was taught to stand up for what she believes which leads to very serious consequences for her. (Non-Fiction/Autobiography)




If I Stay - Gayle Forman

In the blink of an eye, everything changes. Seventeen-year-old Mia has no memory of the accident; she can only recall what happened afterward. Little by little she struggles to put together the pieces --- to figure out what she has lost, what she has left and the very difficult choice she must make. (Fiction)




Kira-Kira - Cynthia Kadohata

The middle daughter in a Japanese-American family tells the story of their struggles to build a better life. (Historical Fiction)



Life As We Knew It – Susan Beth Pfeffer

A meteor hits the moon and in one moment the whole world changes. Food and heat are almost nonexistent. One girl journals her family's desperate struggle for survival. (Science Fiction)



Little Bee – Chris Cleave

What happens on the beach is brutal, and it braids the fates of a 16-year-old Nigerian orphan (who calls herself Little Bee) and a well-off British couple --- journalists who are trying to repair their strained marriage with a free holiday, and who should have stayed behind their resort's walls. (Fiction)




Maximum Ride - James Patterson

Fourteen-year-old Maximum Ride, better known as Max, knows what it's like to soar above the world. She and all the members of the "flock" --- Fang, Iggy, Nudge, Gasman, and Angel --- are just like ordinary kids - ordinary kids who have wings and can fly. Sounds fun, but their lives can morph into nightmares any time! (Fantasy/Adventure)



Murder on the Orient Express - Agatha Christie

An unpopular billionaire is murdered on board a famous train and everyone on board is a suspect. (Fiction/Mystery)



My Sister's Keeper - Jodi Picoult

Conceived as a marrow donor for her gravely ill sister, Anna Fitzgerald has undergone countless surgeries and medical procedures in her short life. When Anna sues her parents for emancipation, it sets off a court case that threatens to destroy the family for good. (Fiction)

Paper Towns - John Green



Margo Roth Spiegelman beckons Quentin Jacobsen in the middle of the night --- dressed like a ninja and plotting an ingenious campaign of revenge. After a lifetime of loving Margo from afar, things are finally looking up for Q . . . Until Margo vanishes. But there are clues. And they're for Q. (Fiction/Mystery)



Perks of Being a Wallflower - Stephen Chbosky

Going through the world of high school and the world of first dates, family dramas, and new friends. (Fiction/Coming of age)



Reading Lolita in Tehran - Azar Nafisi

Every Thursday morning for two years in the Islamic Republic of Iran, a bold and inspired teacher named Azar Nafisi secretly gathered seven of her most committed female students to read forbidden Western classics. (Memoir)



Speak - Laurie Halse Anderson

This is the story of what happens to a girl who is ostracized by her peers after busting an end-of-summer party. (Fiction)



Temple Grandin: How the Girl who loved cows embraced Autism and changed the world -


Temple Grandin

This biography explores the life and mind of Temple Grandin, a brilliant autistic woman who revolutionized the livestock industry. (Non-Fiction/Biography)




That Summer - Sarah Dressen


The Boy in the Striped Pajamas - John Boyne

Bruno and his family are moving to a place where there is no one to play with, nothing to do, and nothing to see except for a long fence. Then one day he meets a new boy, but he doesn't know about the consequences that come with being friends with him. (Historical Fiction)



The Boy Who Dared - Susan Campbell Bartoletti

In jail awaiting his execution, a German teenager recalls Hitler's rise to power and the courage he found to stand up against the Nazi regime. (Historical Fiction)




The Crossover - Kwame Alexander

14-year-old twin basketball stars wrestle with highs and lows on and off the court as their father ignores his declining health. Also consider: *Booked* (Sports/Realistic Fiction/Verse)



The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night - Mark Haddon

A math genius who is afraid of people pretends to be Sherlock Holmes and investigates the murder of a neighbor's dog. He uncovers more mysteries than he expected. (Mystery)



The fault in our stars - John Green

Despite the tumor-shrinking medical miracle that has bought her a few years, Hazel has almost given up. But when a gorgeous plot twist named Augustus Waters suddenly appears at Cancer Kid Support Group, Hazel's story is about to be completely rewritten. (Fiction)



The Five People You Meet in Heaven - Mitch Albom

A war veteran who feels trapped in a meaningless life fixing rides at a seaside amusement park. While trying to save a little girl's life, he dies in a tragic accident. This story focuses on what happens in the afterlife - a place where your earthly life is explained to you by five people who were in it. (Fiction)



The Future of Us - Jay Asher

1996 - Most American high school students have never used the internet. Emma and Josh discover themselves on Facebook, 15 years in the future. Everybody wonders what their destiny will be. Josh and Emma are about to find out. (Fiction)



The Great Greene Heist - Varian Johnson

Jackson Greene has a reputation as a prankster at Maplewood Middle School, but after the last disaster he is trying to go straight--but when it looks like Keith Sinclair may steal the election for school president from Jackson's former best friend Gabriela, he assembles a team to make sure Keith does not succeed.



The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy - Douglas Adams

Seconds before the Earth is demolished to make way for a galactic freeway, an earthman is saved by his friend. Together they journey through the galaxy. (Science Fiction/Fantasy)



The Kill Order - James Dashner

Prequel to the Maze Runner Trilogy (Science Fiction/Adventure)



The Last Lecture - Randy Pausch

When Randy Pausch, a computer science professor at Carnegie Mellon, was asked to give a lecture, he didn't have to imagine it as his last, since he had recently been diagnosed with terminal cancer. But the lecture he gave--"Really Achieving Your Childhood Dreams"--wasn't about dying. It was about the importance of overcoming obstacles, of enabling the dreams of others, of seizing every moment.




The Running Dream - Gwendelin Van Draanen

The main character, A, wakes up in a different body every morning. He runs into complications when he begins to emotionally attach to someone he does not wish to live without. (Fiction)




Never Fall Down - Patricia McCormick


Ghost - Jason Reynolds

Four kids from wildly different backgrounds with personalities that are explosive when they clash are chosen for an elite middle school track team—a team that could qualify them for the Junior Olympics if they can get their acts together. They all have a lot to lose, but they also have a lot to prove, not only to each other but to themselves. Running. That's all Ghost (real name Castle Cranshaw) has ever known. New customers have overrun her family's coffee shop, located far from the mosquito-infested river, and Mattie's concerns of fever are all but overshadowed by dreams of growing her family's small business into a thriving enterprise. But when the fever begins to strike closer to home, Mattie's struggle to build a new life must give way to a new fight—the fight to stay alive (Goodreads Summary).



The Wednesday Wars - Gary D. Schmidt

Meet Holling Hoodhood, a seventh-grader at Camillo Junior High, who must spend Wednesday afternoons with his teacher, Mrs. Baker, while the rest of the class has religious instruction. Mrs. Baker doesn't like Holling—he's sure of it. Why else would she make him read the plays of William Shakespeare outside class? But everyone has bigger things to worry about, like Vietnam. His father wants Holling and his sister to be on their best behavior: the success of his business depends on it. But how can Holling stay out of trouble when he has so much to contend with? A bully demanding cream puffs; angry rats; and a baseball hero signing autographs the very same night Holling has to appear in a play in yellow tights! As fate sneaks up on him again and again, Holling finds Motivation—the Big M—in the most unexpected places and musters up the courage to embrace his destiny, in spite of himself (Goodreads Summary).




Superman: Dawnbreaker- Matt de la Peña


The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind (Young Readers Edition) - William Kampwamba and Bryan Mealer


